




Isles of Refuge: Wildlife and History of the Northwestern Hawaiian Islands

Rauzon shares his extensive firsthand knowledge of the archipelago's natural history and inhabitantsincluding rare palms, sharks, turtles, seals, finches, terns, petrels, boobies, ducks, and albatrosseswhile his engaging and personal narrative also describes his own islandhopping adventures and the small yet vital role in human history played by these island-atolls."While Rauzon, a biologist, packs the book with lots of scholarly information, his lyrical writing style, keen observation and adept story-telling will capture readers.
